Quebeckers' Opinion on the Supreme Court Ruling Regarding Prohibiting Citizens from Paying for Healthcare Covered by the Government

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Methodological Reminder

This study was conducted by Leger Marketing through telephone interviews among a representative sample of 1,000 English- or French-speaking Quebeckers, 18 years of age or older.

The interviews were conducted from our Montreal call centre from June 15 to June 19, 2005. Up to ten call-backs were made in the case of non-response.

Using data from Statistics Canada, the results were weighted according to gender, region, and language spoken at home to ensure a sample representative of the entire Québec adult population. In the end, the maximum margin of error obtained for a sample of 1,000 respondents is \pm 3.1%, 19 times out of 20.




Survey Results



1. Opinion of Quebeckers on the Supreme Court Ruling

• In total, 54% of Quebeckers surveyed approve of the Supreme Court of Canada's ruling whereby the Government of Quebec can no longer prohibit citizens from paying - either directly or through private insurance - for healthcare services already covered by the government. On the other hand, 41% disagree with this ruling.



Among respondents who **agree with the Supreme Court's ruling**, there are **stronger proportions** among groups with the following profile:

- People between 25 and 34 years of age (61%) and between 35 and 44 years of age (62%)
- Those with children under the age of 18 in the household (62%)
- Those who have a gross household income of \$80 000 or above (65%)
- Professionals (64%)
- Those with employment (58%)
- Those with a university level education (62%)
- Those who intend to vote for the Liberal Party (62%) and who intend to vote for the Action Démocratique du Québec (65%)

And there are **significantly more respondents who do not agree with this ruling** among the following people:

- Residents of Eastern Québec (53%)
- Those who do not have children under the age of 18 in the household (45%)
- Those with a gross household income below \$20,000 (56%)
- Students (55%)
- Those without employment (46%)
- Those with an elementary school education (57%)
- Those who intend to vote for the Parti Québécois (47%)


Distribution according to voting intentions

2. Opinion on Government Reaction

• According to 61% of the people surveyed, the Government of Quebec should abide by the Supreme Court's ruling. However, 32% feel that the government should refuse to enforce the judgement by using all the legal means at its disposal. A percentage of 7% of respondents did not give their opinion on this question.



Among respondents who want the government to refuse to enforce the judgement by using the legal means at its disposal, there are stronger proportions among groups with the following profile:

- People between 55 and 64 years of age (39%)
- Francophones (35%)
- Those who do not have children under the age of 18 in the household (35%)
- Manual workers (41%)
- Those who intend to vote for the Parti Québécois (40%)

And there are **significantly more respondents** who **want the government to abide by the ruling** among the following people:

- People between 35 and 44 years of age (71%)
- Non-francophones (71%)
- Those who have children under the age of 18 in the household (70%)
- Professionals (68%)
- Those with a university level education (68%)
- Those who intend to vote for the Liberal Party (72%) and those who intend to vote for the Action Démocratique du Québec (70%)
